

Scripture Commentary by Dianna Bergant CSA



The first reading, frequently called 'The Sacrifice of Isaac', would be better named 'The Testing of Abraham', for the text states that 'God put Abraham to the test' and Isaac is never really sacrificed. The very name Abraham, which means 'father of a multitude' (cf. Gen 7:15), designates his destiny. By offering his son as a sacrifice, his very identity is put to the test. Is Abraham willing to jeopardise his own personal meaning and relinquish hope for a future? His actions demonstrate that his devotion (fear of God) is beyond reproach. He relinquished his natural claim on the child of promise, and he is blessed with a promise of more children than he can count.

The constancy of his faith enabled the psalmist to speak of his ordeal. Before he could open his heart in thanksgiving, he had to deal with the apparent that suffering contradiction often presents. Is it really a sign of God's displeasure? Must it always be seen as a consequence of sinful behaviour? The psalmist clearly asserts that misfortune and culpability are not to be equated. The relationship between the psalmist and God is strikingly characterised in the metaphors 'servant' and its parallel 'son of your handmaid'. The psalm moves from faithfulness in the face of distress, through release from servitude by God, to public celebration of thanksgiving for this deliverance.

This is my Son, the Beloved. Listen to him

Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones, who will condemn them, and who will justify them? Paul argues that the sovereign God is on our side and so regardless of what can be mustered against us, it is nothing in comparison to God's power and compassion. If God was willing to make the supreme sacrifice of handing over this beloved son for our sake, surely God will not deny us whatever other trivial things we might need. After all that God has done for us and given to us, would God condemn us? It seems unlikely. Having sacrificed himself for the sake of others, Jesus now sits at God's right hand, pleading on our behalf.

The transfiguration of Jesus knits together traditions of Israel's past, insights into Jesus' identity, and a glimpse into eschatological fulfillment. The seventh day could be an allusion to the Sabbath, the day set aside for encounter with God. Both Moses and Elijah (representing the law and the prophets) are associated with mountains (cf., Exod 19; 1 Kgs 19), and both underwent a kind of transformation (cf., Exod 34:29-35; 2 Kgs 2:11). The voice from heaven identifies Jesus as the beloved Son, reminiscent of Isaac, who was also a beloved son (cf. Gen 22:2). The three tents recall the Feast of Tabernacles when the Jews built temporary dwellings during their sojourn in the wilderness. That feast eventually took on messianic undertones (cf. Zech 14:16-19). The transfiguration is, then, a prefigurement of such fulfillment.

First Reading

Genesis 22:1-2. 9-13. 15-18

God put Abraham to the test. 'Abraham, Abraham,' he called.' Here I am' he replied. 'Take your son,' God said 'your only child Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him as a burnt offering, on a mountain I will point out to you.'

When they arrived at the place God had pointed out to him, Abraham built an altar there, and arranged the wood. Then he bound his son Isaac and put him on the altar on top of the wood. Abraham stretched out his hand and seized the knife to kill his son.

But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven. 'Abraham, Abraham' he said. 'I am here' he replied. 'Do not raise your hand against the boy' the angel said. 'Do not harm him, for now I know you fear God. You have not refused me your son, your only son.' Then looking up, Abraham saw a ram caught by its horns in a bush. Abraham took the ram and offered it as a burnt offering in place of his son.

The angel of the Lord called Abraham a second time from heaven. 'I swear by my own self – it is the Lord who speaks – because you have done this, because you have not refused me your son, your only son, I will shower blessings on you, I will make your descendants as many as the stars of heaven and the grains of sand on the seashore. Your descendants shall gain possession of the gates of your enemies. All the nations of the earth shall bless themselves by your descendants, as a reward for your obedience.'

With God on our side who can be against us? Since God did not spare his own Son, but gave him up to benefit us all, we may be certain, after such a gift, that he will not refuse anything he can give. Could anyone accuse those that God has chosen? When God acquits, could anyone condemn? Could Christ Jesus? No! He not only died for us – he rose from the dead, and there at God's right hand he stands and pleads for us.

Mark 9:2-10

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone by themselves. There in their presence he was transfigured: his clothes became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleacher could make them. Elijah appeared to them with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Rabbi,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He did not know what to say; they were so frightened. And a cloud came, covering them in shadow; and there came a voice from the cloud, 'This is my Son, the Beloved. Listen to him.' Then suddenly, when they looked round, they saw no one with them any more but only Jesus.

As they came down from the mountain he warned them to tell no one what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what 'rising from the dead' could mean.

Reflection for Young People By Lisa-Marie Calderone-Stewart

Have you ever experienced a place or situation that was breathtaking, incredible, glorious and awesome? something that filled you with joy and life and zeal? What was it like? Where was it? What made it so special? Were you alone or with others? Were you able to explain it to someone who was not there? Why or why not?

Why do you think Jesus wanted Peter, James and John to experience him as a glistening, dazzling, transfigured vision? How do you think that affected their faith? How would it have affected your faith? How does it affect your faith just reading about it?

Peter did not want to leave that mountaintop experience. He wanted to build some booths and just 'camp out' there for a while. Why was it better for Jesus and Peter and the others to come down from the mountain? Why is it important for us to enjoy and remember our 'peak' experiences, but leave them behind and come back to our everyday life?
