Scripture Commentary by Dianna Bergant CSA



This text clearly states that Moses is the prophet par excellence. He received the word of the Lord in the form of the Law and acted as God's spokesperson by promulgating it. Several features mark the prophet. First, the true prophet does not independently assume the role of spokesperson, but is raised up by God (vv.15, 18). Second, the prophet is not an outsider, but is called forth from among the people (v.15). Third, the message is not the prophet's, but is God's (v.18). Finally, because this prophet speaks God's words, in God's name, with God's authority, whoever disregards the message or speaks in the name of any other god is liable to divine punishment.

The psalm combines an invitation to praise, a plea for openness and a divine word. God is perceived as a rock of salvation, the creator and a shepherd caring for a flock. Because of their responsibility for the people, monarchs were often characterised as shepherds. These images of rock and shepherd illustrate the people's perception of God as protector. The psalmist issues a serious plea to be open to the voice of God 'today'. There is an appeal for a positive response, not in the spirit of rebellion that governed their ancestors while they were in the wilderness (cf. Exod 17:1-7; Deut 6:16). God desires hearts that are open,

not hardened by selfishness or a lack of faith.

Paul firmly believed that the end was near. He did not outrightly oppose marriage, but the inevitability of the end suggested to him, that it would be better to be unmarried. He contrasts anxiety about the things of the Lord with anxiety about the things of the world. He knew that those involved in the world could still be committed to the Lord. He acknowledges that those married assume responsibility for the survival of the race, concerned with the things of this world so that the next generations can enjoy a prosperous future. He is careful to admit that he is giving an opinion and not an injunction that would impose restraints upon his hearers.

Following the custom of the time, Jesus took his turn teaching in the synagogue. The people were accustomed to the manner of teaching of the scribes, the official teachers who relied for their authority on the precedents already set by the teaching of others. Jesus, on the other hand, taught as one having authority in his own right. The people in the synagogue marvelled at this. The exorcism may have been an outward manifestation of this unusual authority. It describes a confrontation between good and evil. The evil spirit's acknowledgment of Jesus' superiority is confirmed by the question posed: Have you come to destroy us? Just as the people were astonished by the teaching of Jesus, so they are amazed at his power over the evil spirit.



# **First Reading**

#### Deuteronomy 18:15-20

Moses said to the people: 'Your God will raise up for you a prophet like myself, from among yourselves, from your own brothers; to him you must listen. This is what you yourselves asked of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the Assembly. "Do not let me hear again" you said "the voice of the Lord my God, nor look any longer on this great fire, or I shall die"; and the Lord said to me, "All they have spoken is well said. I will raise up a prophet like yourself for them from their own brothers; I will put my words into his mouth and he shall tell them all I command him. The man who does not listen to my words that he speaks in my name, shall be held answerable to me for it. But the prophet who presumes to say in my name a thing I have not commanded him to say, or who speaks in the name of other gods, that prophet shall die.""

# Second Reading

#### 1 Corinthians 7:32-35

I would like to see you free from all worry. An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

# Gospel

#### Mark 1:21-28

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority.

In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.

#### Reflection for Young People By Dianne Bergant CSA

Discipleship requires a change in us. We want to change because in so many ways we are being strangled to death by demons. We are caught in dysfunction and sin; we live in the midst of the battle between good and evil, the struggle of human finitude and failure. We are plunged into the throes of human suffering and pain, and there seems to be no escape.

The demonic seduces us in more ways than we can count and we are often caught in its web before we recognise what has happened. There have always been many and varied voices that claim to have the remedy for our ills. Preachers and politicians have stirred up crowds and ignited their emotions. Promises have been made and predictions advanced, yet the conflict goes on, the demons continue to hold sway. The demon recognised the authority in the voice of Jesus. Do we recognise it?

When we are released by Jesus from the demons that possess us, we are freed from the stranglehold of evil and liberated to live far less encumbered and divided lives. No Earthly reality will possess us, neither relationships nor obligations nor even religious practices. Rather, we will be possessed by Christ who liberates us for the reign of God. Therefore, whether married or unmarried, whether in the midst of the community or at its margins, we will be able to heed the voice of God in our hearts and to recognise Jesus in our midst.
