Scripture Commentary by Dianna Bergant CSA



Leprosy was a general term that covered a wide variety of chronic skin diseases. It caused skin to break thus exuding bodily fluids. The issue here is bodily boundaries, not hygiene. Since bodily fluids belonged within the body, emissions other than the normal functions of elimination were clearly out of place. Those with skin ailments were deemed unclean, were banished from the community, and were required to keep their distance from others, for anyone who had direct contact with someone or something unclean was considered unclean. Because social and religious alienation was so severe, it was believed that the condition was brought on by some kind of sin. Such thinking did not prevent Jesus from showing compassion.

The psalm is one of the Penitential Psalms. The double statement of blessedness introduces wisdom teaching about the benefits of God's merciful pardon, which is valued more highly than prosperity or reputation. Anyone so treated by God is truly blessed. This is not 'cheap grace'. Forgiveness is not given indiscriminately. Rather, it is given to those who have honestly sought forgiveness, who have admitted their sinfulness and have repented of it. The psalm ends with an exhortation to rejoice. If one is just, then rejoicing is not only encouraged, it is probably a spontaneous response to God's

magnanimous mercy. The psalmist's experience of personal contrition and divine clemency is offered as an example for others to follow.

Paul describes the delicate balance that existed between the freedom he enjoyed because of his faith in Christ and his need to accommodate himself to those to whom he was preaching. He feared that they would be repelled by something that was not intrinsic to the gospel. The gospel is demanding enough. People did not need to be burdened with obligations extraneous to its message. Conflict occurred whenever the attitudes that operated within one religious system were transferred to another. Paul insists that neither Jewish dietary laws nor the assertion of one's freedom should be the governing principle in the lives of Christians. The glory of God and sensitivity to the consciences of others should be the driving force.

The man in the gospel suffered from some kind of skin ailment. Though socially alienated and ritually unclean, he did not adhere to the laws of purity. Instead, he boldly approached Jesus and begged to be made clean, not to be cured. Social and religious acceptability seem to be more important to him than physical healing. Since impurity was considered contagious, to touch the man would make Jesus unclean. But it didn't. Instead, Jesus' touch healed the man and restored him to the state of ritual purity. Because the people were captivated by the wonders he could perform, Jesus chose the seclusion of solitary places rather than the press of the crowd and their misunderstanding of his mission.

First Reading

Leviticus 13:1-2. 44-46

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron, 'If a swelling or scab or shiny spot appears on a man's skin, a case of leprosy of the skin is to be suspected. The man must be taken to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests who are his sons.

'The man is leprous: he is unclean. The priest must declare him unclean; he is suffering from leprosy of the head. A man infected with leprosy must wear his clothing torn and his hair disordered; he must shield his upper lip and cry, "Unclean, unclean". As long as the disease lasts he must be unclean; and therefore he must live apart; he must live outside the camp.'

A leper came to Jesus and pleaded on his knees: 'If you want to' he said 'you can cure me.' Feeling sorry for him, Jesus stretched out his hand and touched him. 'Of course I want to!' he said. 'Be cured!' And the leprosy left him at once and he was cured. Jesus immediately sent him away and sternly ordered him, 'Mind you say nothing to anyone, but go and show yourself to the priest, and make the offering for your healing prescribed by Moses as evidence of your recovery.' The man went away, but then started talking about it freely and telling the story everywhere, so that Jesus could no longer go openly into any town, but had to stay outside in places where nobody lived. Even so, people from all around would come to him.



Reflection for Young People By Dianne Bergant CSA

We know that we will all have to face some kind of suffering, and so we try to prepare ourselves for it. Yet when it comes, as prepared as we try to be, it can overtake us with such fury that we fall back defenceless. We look to others for support and assistance, and if we are fortunate, we find it. However, even in the most supportive of communities, suffering tends to alienate us from those who are healthy and secure. Suffering reminds us of our own finitude and the contingent nature of all of life. It threatens our sense of order.

Jesus is not deterred by human suffering. He welcomes all who approach him; his healing touch reincorporates those who have been ostracised; his loving embrace reassociates those who have been alienated. In the reign of God, there are no outsiders. All belong to Jesus, and, therefore, all belong to each other. When the one afflicted is embraced by the community, the community is an authentic manifestation of the inclusive reign of God.

In suffering we witness human vulnerability and our desperate need of each other and of God. There, at the edge of life and on the fringes of the community, we may experience the tenderness and compassion of God. The loving touch of Christ that can heal our souls, if not our bodies. It is there that we may most authentically participate in the cross of Christ. Joined to him we are anything but unproductive or worthless.
