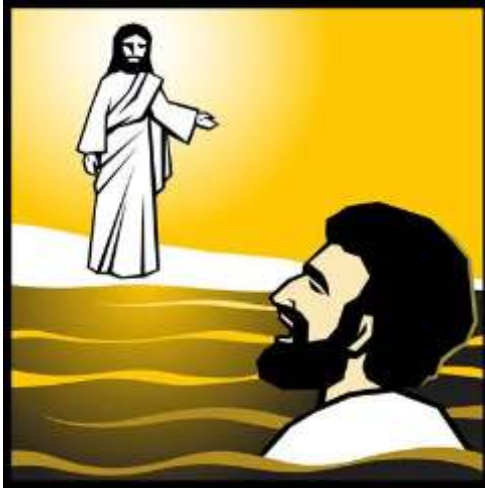

Scripture Commentary by Dianne Bergant CSA



delight in the misfortune. The prayer asks to be preserved from this insult as well. Following the initial plea is an acknowledgment of deliverance. God has heard the petition and has granted the request for rescue. The psalmist calls on others to give thanks for God's holiness.

In John's vision, angels, living creatures and elders surround the divine throne. The song sung is a hymn of praise. The seven prerogatives listed (v.12) are conferred upon the Lamb. Since this investiture takes place in heaven, and those around the throne represent all of creation, one can conclude that the rule conferred upon the Lamb is cosmic and universal. The theology behind the vision is more specifically theological than Christological. God is seated on the throne, the Lamb is not. Nor is the Lamb identified with God. Finally, any divine attribute that the Lamb possesses has been given by God. Worship of and devotion to Christ must be understood in terms of his relationship with God.

The gospel opens with an account of a miraculous catch of fish into which is woven a second report, that of a meal on the shore (vv.1-14). This is followed by an exchange between Jesus and Peter (vv. 15-19). It begins and ends with the announcement that the risen Jesus revealed himself to his disciples (vv. 1, 14). Here recognition comes through Jesus' actions, not through his words. Only after they pulled in the multitude of fish did anyone recognise him. A meal prepared by the risen Jesus certainly has eucharistic or at least eschatological connotations. Jesus' exchange with Peter has links with Peter's earlier denial of him. Three times he denied Jesus; three times he is called upon to declare his love. He is then commissioned to assume the role of shepherd in the place of Jesus.

The court scene in the first reading describes apostles who are courageous witnesses to the resurrection of Jesus and heralds to the world of this wondrous event. Peter, acting as their spokesperson, launches into a short sermon consisting of the fundamental apostolic proclamation. He situates Jesus squarely within the tradition of Israel by identifying the God who exalts Jesus as the God of the ancestors. Furthermore, he claims that the exalted Jesus is leader and saviour, two roles traditionally ascribed to Moses. Finally, he maintains that the opportunities for repentance and forgiveness of sin, for which Israel awaited, will be granted through Jesus, who was crucified but now exalted.

This is a psalm of thanksgiving for deliverance from the place of death. The allusion to death can also be an allusion to illness, to depression, or to any serious misfortune that can threaten life. Whatever the actual danger might have been, it is now past; God intervened and saved the petitioner. In addition to the actual calamity, the psalmist is also concerned with enemies who would take

First Reading

Acts of the Apostles 5:27-32. 40-41

The high priest demanded an explanation of the apostles. 'We gave you a formal warning,' he said 'not to preach in this name, and what have you done? You have filled Jerusalem with your teaching, and seem determined to fix the guilt of this man's death on us.' In reply Peter and the apostles said, 'Obedience to God comes before obedience to men; it was the God of our ancestors who raised up Jesus, but it was you who had him executed by hanging on a tree. By his own right hand God has now raised him up to be leader and saviour, to give repentance and forgiveness of sins through him to Israel. We are witnesses to all this, we and the Holy Spirit whom God has given to those who obey him.' They warned the apostles not to speak in the name of Jesus and released them. And so they left the presence of the Sanhedrin glad to have had the honour of suffering humiliation for the sake of the name.

Second Reading

Revelation 5:11-14

In my vision, I, John, heard the sound of an immense number of angels gathered round the throne and the animals and the elders; there were ten thousand times ten thousand of them and thousands upon thousands, shouting, 'The Lamb that was sacrificed is worthy to be given power, riches, wisdom, strength, honour, glory and blessing.' Then I heard all the living things in creation – everything that lives in the air, and on the ground, and under the ground, and in the sea, crying, 'To the One who is sitting on the throne and to the Lamb, be all praise, honour, glory and power, for ever and ever.' And the four animals said, 'Amen'; and the elders prostrated themselves to worship.

Gospel

John 21:1-19

Jesus showed himself again to the disciples. It was by the Sea of Tiberias, and it happened like this: Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael from Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee and two more of his disciples were together. Simon Peter said, 'I'm going fishing.' They replied, 'We'll come with you.' They went out and got into the boat but caught nothing that night.

It was light by now and there stood Jesus on the shore, though the disciples did not realise that it was Jesus. Jesus called out, 'Have you caught anything, friends?' And when they answered, 'No', he said, 'Throw the net out to starboard and you'll find something.' So they dropped the net, and there were so many fish that they could not haul it in. The disciple Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord.' At these words 'It is the Lord', Simon Peter, who had practically nothing on, wrapped his cloak round him and jumped into the water. The other disciples came on in the boat, towing the net and the fish; they were only about a hundred yards from land.

As soon as they came ashore they saw that there was some bread there, and a charcoal fire with fish cooking on it. Jesus said, 'Bring some of the fish you have just caught.' Simon Peter went aboard and dragged the net to the shore, full of big fish, one hundred and fifty-three of them; and in spite of there being so many the net was not broken. Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' None of the disciples was bold enough to ask, 'Who are you?'; they knew quite well it was the Lord. Jesus then stepped forward, took the bread and gave it to them, and the same with the fish. This was the third time that Jesus showed himself to the disciples after rising from the dead.

After the meal Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these others do?' He answered, 'Yes Lord, you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.' A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He replied, 'Yes, Lord, you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Look after my sheep.' Then he said to him a third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter was upset that he asked him the third time, 'Do you love me?' and said, 'Lord, you know everything; you know I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep.

'I tell you most solemnly, when you were young you put on your own belt and walked where you liked; but when you grow old you will stretch out your hands, and somebody else will put a belt round you and take you where you would rather not go.'

In these words he indicated the kind of death by which Peter would give glory to God. After this he said, 'Follow me.'

Have you ever been fishing? If so, did you enjoy it? If you have never been fishing, do you think you would enjoy it? What would you say are the biggest challenges of fishing? What is most frustrating about it? What is most rewarding?

If you were fishing on one side of the boat and you were not catching any fish, would you follow someone's suggestion to switch sides? Do you think that could help? Jesus had the disciples do this more than once in the Gospel stories. Why do you think he told them to do that? Why do you think they listened to him?

The Apostles became courageously loyal to Jesus. Eventually, most of them were martyred. How would you explain such conviction? Is there anything or anyone you could feel that loyal to? Why or why not? What would you be willing to do for that person or cause?
